Sparta Township 4th of July Parade

The NJAE&MC had a turnout of nine tractors and one fire engine for the **Sparta 4**th **of July Parade**. The day was quite warm and quite sunny and best spent under a big tree with a cool drink. However, about a dozen Club members braved the weather to thrill Sparta residents with their great old tractors. Leading off the Club's entries was Jim Dunlap, driving a 1930 Ford Model AA Fire Truck, with AnnMarie Adams as a passenger. No doubt Jim's going to need some remedial tractor recognition classes (tractors have big wheels in the back, Jim) but the fire truck did make a striking leader for the Club entries. Following Jim & AnnMarie was Sparta resident Bob Eckes aboard his award winning 1938 John Deere Model A. Next was farmer Ed Scott driving his 1958 J.D. 630, Bill Howell on his 1949 J.D. Model MT, and Josh Will with his 1961 J.D. 2510. Following Josh on his awesome 1947 Case VAC was esteemed Club President Blace Flatt, and then Kevin Adams on his 1948 Ford 8N "working tractor". Blace was almost a noshow when his Case conked out while leaving the tractor load/unload parking lot. Being the master at starting engines, however, Blace was able to quickly find the problem, fire up his tractor, and drive to our club staging area before the start of the parade. Behind Kevin was Sam Milens on the Milens' outstanding 1957 Ford 841, pulling the Club's hay wagon, followed by his dad Doug on his 1945 Ford 2N. Holding up the rear in grand style was Bruce Mitchell and granddaughter Sareena, both with big smiles atop Bruce's stunning Minneapolis-Moline 335. Being the loving granddad that he is, I wonder how long it will be 'till we see Sareena tooling down the parade route on the M-M and Bruce sitting under the tree with me.

Well, enjoy Luke's photos of the club members and their tractors and fire engine. You may notice that Luke took the photos before the Club tractors were cranking down the road. The First Farm "Tractor"



Hart-Parr

In 1902 Hart-Parr became the first "commercially successful" manufacturer of "production-run" internal combustion powered traction engines. Previously "one-ofs" had been built or converted from steam traction engines by other manufacturers. Their gasoline fueled engine was a Hart-Parr designed and built "hit and miss" engine; included oil cooling (the structure on the front of the pictured traction engine is an oil cooling tower), a force fed lubrication system, overhead cam with valves-in-head, magneto ignition and a vaporizing (Benz-Csonka-Banki styled) carburetor.

Incorporated in the late 1890's in Madison, Wisconsin as engine builders, Hart-Parr's factory in Charles City, Iowa was opened in 1902 and used exclusively to build traction engines. This was their principle business and not just a side-line, as with most manufacturers of the period.

In 1907 their sales manager, W.H. William, shortened the name traction engine to "tractor" to differentiate the gas powered machines from their steam powered cousins and in 1912, as they began to build smaller tractors, changed the name to "farm tractor". The industry followed in each instance.

In 1929 Hart-Parr, the Oliver Chilled Plow Co., the Nichols & Shepard Co. and the American Seeding Co. merged to form the Oliver Farm Equipment Co.

The above picture is the Hart-Parr No. 3, serial number 1207...one of 40 manufactured in 1903. Old No. 3 was refurbished in 2003 for its centennial year birthday. The traction engine is a 17/30...rated at 17 drawbar and 30 belt horsepower with a 9" bore and 13" stroke horizontal 2 cylinder engine. The tractor is owned by the *Smithsonian* Institute and was brought back to life thru the efforts of the Hart-Parr-Oliver Collectors Association and the I&I (Illinois and Indiana) Antique Tractor and Gas Engine Club in 2003. The 1903 No. 3 is the oldest "operational" tractor in the world and is housed at the I&I Show Grounds and Museum in Penfield, Illinois.
